












What kind of learning we aim to promote? - The three metaphors of learning

(Sfard 1998, Paavola & Hakkarainen 2005)

Focus on individual learners. Emphasis on learning conceptual knowledge and practical skills as effectively as possible. Learning is building knowledge structures in mind.

Learning as knowledge creation "Trialogical" Developing shared objects and practices Focus on novel, shared outcomes. Emphasis on creating content that is used for something. Learning is also creating new solutions for a relevant purpose.

Learning as knowledge acquisition "Monological" Processes within mind



Focus on social interaction and community practices. Emphasis on authentic situations and hands-on tasks. Learning is also social growth, adopting cultural practices and building identity.










Examples of pedagogical methods and the metaphors of learning

Collecting ideas in a shared forum
Group discussion for making a synthesis
Making a report or a presentation in groups
Making a video about a topic

Lecture with activating task
Drill-and-practice tests
Learning games
Reading material and taking an exam
Writing an essay about the subject



Singing together Argumentation exercise Peer-commenting Laboratory work in groups Speaking a foreign language
